The Minister for Education has released a VET issues paper highlighting the key challenges facing delivery of VET to school students. The paper seeks feedback on how they can be addressed to maximise the benefit of VET for students, employers and the South Australian economy.

The work is being complemented by a review of career counselling and a review of costing and funding VET. All of this work will inform a VET for schools policy released later in the year.

## Parent Communication With Students

The Department for Education recently released a set of directions for sites regarding the facilitation of contact between parents and students. We welcome parents and guardians as part of our school community, with the following being valid reasons for a parent or guardian phoning or visiting the school:

- passing on information in an emergency
- collecting a child for an appointment
- attending special events
- educational meetings
- assembly, sports day and similar school or preschool events
- volunteering or working at the school or preschool.

Contacting your child during lesson time can be unsettling and disruptive to their learning. Please consider the level of importance for contacting your child and make the front office your first port of call. We are always happy to pass on information to your child at an appropriate time.

## Enterprise Agreement

You may have seen on the news this week, that the Department for Education made an offer regarding the negotiations that have been ongoing since June 2018, over salary and employment conditions for school and preschool employees. We will keep you informed as to the direction that the AEU (Australian Education Union) and its branch members will be taking with regard to the offer.

## Deputy Principal's News

Last week Julie-Anne and I participated in a workshop where we learnt about facilitating community conferences while focusing on restorative practices. It was an intensive couple of days where we reviewed the research behind restorative practices, participated in, and facilitated mock conferences. We have been working together restoratively at school for a number of years now and reflecting on our journey I think we need to remind ourselves that while being restorative takes a lot of time and energy, the building of relationships and healing is paramount in maintaining a positive culture in our school community. Margaret Thorsborne (Restorative practitioner, author and trainer) comments that

**'a more relational approach to problem-solving creates a more positive school climate, a greater sense of connectedness and well-being for all members of the school community and greater engagement in learning'**

Key questions we ask when things go wrong include:

-who has been hurt (and how)?


-what do they need?

-who should be responsible for meeting these needs?

A key concept of restorative practices is *healing for those harmed by incidents of inappropriate behaviour is vital, as is the healing of those responsible*. A restorative view of the world holds that although sometimes people do bad things, we are all essentially moral and good, and when we are not acting in a way that is moral and good, we can be shown how to do so by a community that sees the best in us.

We are hoping to run some training sessions for parents about Restorative Practices later this year.

Survey results from the 2019 Wellbeing and Engagement collection (Y5-10 students) indicate that the majority of our students report a high level of connectedness to our school. We hope to build on these results to enable our students further connectedness and positive wellbeing well beyond their school years.





# New working with children checks



## What if someone who works or volunteers with children doesn't have a check?

Some work-types that didn't require checks to work with children under the old laws may now have to have a working with children check.

If someone who works or volunteers with children does not have a **current check**, their options are:

- have their organisation apply for a DHS child-related employment screening before 1 July 2019
  - wait until 1 July 2019 to apply for a WWCC themselves.

From 1 July 2019 people can't work or volunteer with children unless they have a valid check. It is an offence to:

- work or volunteer in a child-related role without a working with children check
- work or volunteer in a child-related role if a person is 'prohibited from working with children'
- employ a person or volunteer for a child-related role who doesn't have a valid working with children check, or is prohibited from working with children.

Offences carry fines of up to \$120,000 and/or prison sentences.

## Why has the law changed?

The WWCC is being introduced to help keep children safe in our communities. The change is part of the Government of South Australia's response to recommendations in the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse and the South Australian Child Protection Systems Royal Commission (also known as the Nyland Report).

## Do people who already have a check need a new one?

### Who needs a WWCC?

People need a WWCC if they are in a 'prescribed position'. This means people who:

- are in paid or volunteering roles where it is reasonably foreseeable that they will work with children
  - run or manage a business where the employees or volunteers work with children
  - are employed to provide preschool, primary or secondary education to a child.

## Who does not need a WWCC?

A person does not need a WWCC if they:

- work for SA Police or the Australian Federal Police
- employ or supervise children in a workplace, unless the work is child-related (e.g. managing a fast food restaurant that employs people under 18)

## What if someone who works or volunteers with children doesn't have a check?

Some work-types that didn't require checks to work with children under the old laws may now have to have a working with children check.

If the new information means a person poses a risk to children, their status will change to **prohibited from working or volunteering with children**.

The DHS Screening Unit will advise the person and organisation(s) that has verified the person works or volunteers with them, in writing.

## What does a WWCC cost?

The Government of South Australia determines the cost of government services, including screening, each financial year. As the new WWCC starts on 1 July 2019, its fee for 2019/20 hasn't yet been determined. However, as a guide, it will follow the same fee structure as the current DHS child-related employment screening, which is \$107.80 for 2018/19.

If a WWCC is only for volunteer work, it will continue to be free, just like other types of screening checks for volunteers.

South Australia has introduced stronger, transparent and more effective screening laws for people working or volunteering with children.

The new laws mean that, from 1 July 2019, everyone working or volunteering with children must have a valid clearance, such as a new working with children check (WWCC).

## Why has the law changed?

The WWCC is being introduced to help keep children safe in our communities. The change is part of the Government of South Australia's response to recommendations in the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse and the South Australian Child Protection Systems Royal Commission (also known as the Nyland Report).

## How long does it take to get a WWCC?

Currently, most screening applications are finalised within three weeks. It can take longer if there is a lot of background information to assess or the information is complex.

In the lead-up to 1 July 2019 and once the new law starts, the DHS Screening Unit is expecting an increased number of applications. Don't leave applications until the last minute – allow a minimum of six weeks for processing.

## How long is a WWCC valid?

A WWCC is valid for five years (up from three).

**What if someone gets a WWCC and then commits an offence?**

The DHS Screening Unit continuously monitors information that may affect a person's WWCC status. The system helps reduce the risk of harm to children and vulnerable people.

### Writing update



Seth said "A simile is comparing two things like saying I am as tired as a sloth"





## Mental Health First Aid for the Suicidal Person

### Do you know how to help a suicidal person?

This **NEW** 4-hour specialised Mental Health First Aid course is now available.

#### What is the Mental Health First Aid for the Suicidal Person Course?

This new course is based on our expert consensus guidelines 'Suicidal Thoughts and Behaviours: First Aid Guidelines'. Curriculum content is evidence-based, with the input of both mental health professionals, researchers and consumer advocates.

Training consists of 4 hours face-to-face training and course participants receive a Handbook and online Certificate of Completion. This training complements the 12-hour Standard MHFA course and the 14-hour Youth MHFA course.

#### Who can attend?

Any interested adult can attend. This course is not a therapy or support group or a postvention course, rather it is an education course and it is important that people undertaking the course are feeling relatively robust when they undertake it. It is not recommended for individuals recently bereaved by suicide.
