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DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S NEWS

Welcome back to school for Term 4. I often think of Term 4 as the term of application, consolidation and celebration. Although the end of year is in sight, we must continue to apply ourselves to our teaching and learning. Often our learning and understanding of things is consolidated near the end of the year. It is great to look back at the end of the year, to acknowledge and celebrate growth and goals that were achieved.

Please find following a summary of the feedback from the Y7-9 Canberra Camp.

Summary of students' feedback:

(97% of students who participated on the camp completed the survey. Response options included poor, satisfactory, good or excellent).

- 94% of students rated the **overall experience** as either good or excellent
- Comments: 'The trip was very exciting and a great experience' 'It was one of the best camps I have been on, but I wish we could choose who and where we wanted to sit on the bus'.*
- The students' favourite places included Questacon, the Australian War Memorial, Indoor Rock Climbing, the Australian Institute of Sport, the snow (Perisher Valley) and Old Parliament House (the Museum of Australian Democracy).
- 60% of the students rated the **accommodation** as either good or excellent.
- 30% of the students rated the **food** as either good or excellent.
- 57% of the students rated the **travelling (bus) experience** as either good or excellent.

Summary of parents' feedback: (72% of families completed the survey).

- Planning and communication** between the school and parents **before** the camp:
- Good 95%, Satisfactory 5%, Poor 0%
- Overall **communication** between staff and parents while the camp was in **progress**:
- Good 81%, Satisfactory 14%, Poor 5%
- Rate the **fundraising activities** for the Canberra Camp:
- Good 62%, Satisfactory 38%, Excessive 0%
- Fund raising activities for the Canberra Camp - Rate **your involvement** in **fundraising activities** during the last **3 years**:
- Heavily involved 20%, Some involvement 70%, Not involved 10%
- Rate the **cost** of the camp as experienced by your family:
- Too cheap 5%, Affordable 90%, Too high 5%
- Rate the **overall experience** as discussed between you and your child/ren:
- Excellent 100%, Satisfactory 0%, Poor 0%
- What is your family's preference re travel to Canberra?
- Travel by **coach** 29%, Travel by **aeroplane** 33%, Travel by either **coach or aeroplane** 33%

Summary of attending adults' feedback:

- 100% of attending adults who completed the survey rated the **overall experience** as excellent.
- Comments: 'Went to many places that I believe not many families would not take their child, a lifetime of memories.' 'I enjoyed this trip so much. I feel privileged to be able to attend and I learnt so much from all the places we visited'.*
- The Indoor Rock Climbing Centre and the Australian War Memorial were rated by all attending adults as excellent experiences.
- 100% of the attending adults who completed the survey rated the **accommodation** as either good or excellent.
- 100% of the attending adults who completed the survey rated the **food** as either good or excellent.
- 100% of the attending adults who completed the survey rated the **travelling (bus) experience** as either good or excellent.

Interim reports for students from Years 7-11 were sent home at the end of the last term. Please discuss your child's report with them (if you haven't already) and follow up with a parent/teacher interview if requested or if you would like to make one.

Currently our R-9 students are learning some new dance steps with the representative from 'Footsteps'. Perhaps you could have a dance-off and check out their moves, exercise and laughter is good for health!

STUDENT MEDICATION

Medication should only be sent to school if absolutely necessary. Medication that has to be taken 3 times per day can be taken **before** and **after** school, and **before bedtime**.

If sending medication to school it must be delivered in the original container, with the label from the pharmacy. You can ask your pharmacist for a second, labelled container to keep the extra medication at home.

This must also be accompanied with a Medication Authority, completed by the parent/caregiver giving staff consent to administer the medication.

Medication **must be** handed in to staff at the front office at the start of the day for administering.

New working with children checks

South Australia has introduced stronger, transparent and more effective screening laws for people working or volunteering with children.

The new laws mean that, from 1 July 2019, everyone working or volunteering with children must have a valid clearance, such as a new working with children check (WWCC).

Why has the law changed?

The WWCC is being introduced to help keep children safe in our communities. The change is part of the Government of South Australia's response to recommendations in the *Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse* and the *South Australian Child Protection Systems Royal Commission* (also known as the Nyland Report).

Who needs a WWCC?

- People need a WWCC if they are in a 'prescribed position'. This means people who:
- are in paid or volunteering roles where it is reasonably foreseeable that they will work with children
 - run or manage a business where the employees or volunteers work with children
 - are employed to provide preschool, primary or secondary education to a child.

Who does not need a WWCC?

- A person does not need a WWCC if they:
- work for SA Police or the Australian Federal Police
 - employ or supervise children in a workplace, unless the work is child-related (e.g. managing a fast food restaurant that employs people under 18)

What if someone who works or volunteers with children doesn't have a check?

Some work-types that didn't require checks to work with children under the old laws may now have to have a working with children check.

If someone who works or volunteers with children does not have a current check, their options are:

- have their organisation apply for a DHS child-related employment screening before 1 July 2019
- wait until 1 July 2019 to apply for a WWCC themselves.

From 1 July 2019 people can't work or volunteer with children unless they have a valid check. It is an offence to:

- work or volunteer in a child-related role without a working with children check
- work or volunteer in a child-related role if a person is 'prohibited from working with children'
- employ a person or volunteer for a child-related role who doesn't have a valid working with children check, or is prohibited from working with children.

Offences carry fines of up to \$120,000 and/or prison sentences.

How does someone get a WWCC?

From 1 July 2019, people can apply online for a WWCC at screening.sa.gov.au

How long does it take to get a WWCC?

Currently, most screening applications are finalised within three weeks. It can take longer if there is a lot of background information to assess or the information is complex.

In the lead-up to 1 July 2019 and once the new law starts, the DHS Screening Unit is expecting an increased number of applications. Don't leave applications until the last minute – allow a minimum of six weeks for processing.

How long is a WWCC valid?

A WWCC is valid for five years (up from three).

What if someone gets a WWCC and then commits an offence?

The DHS Screening Unit continuously monitors information that may affect a person's WWCC status. The system helps reduce the risk of harm to children and vulnerable people.

The DHS Screening Unit receives information from a range of databases, which is automatically searched for any new information relevant to an person's WWCC status.

If the new information means a person poses a risk to children, their status will change to **prohibited from working or volunteering with children**.

The DHS Screening Unit will advise the person and organisation(s) that has verified the person works or volunteers with them, in writing.

What does a WWCC cost?

The Government of South Australia determines the cost of government services, including screening, each financial year. As the new WWCC starts on 1 July 2019, its fee for 2019/20 hasn't yet been determined. However, as a guide, it will follow the same fee structure as the current DHS child-related employment screening, which is \$107.80 for 2018/19.

If a WWCC is only for volunteer work, it will continue to be free, just like other types of screening checks for volunteers.

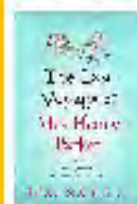
