Principal's News

The bushfire on the edge of Port Lincoln this week, highlighted to all, the importance of having a Bushfire Plan, so that you are prepared in case of such an unexpected incident. Two weeks ago we sent out an email to all families with a copy of the 'Bushfires and Your Child's School or Preschool – A Guide for Families' attached. Although we are situated in a low-risk bushfire area (rated R3), it is still very important for parents to read this information and become familiar with actions that will be taken on Catastrophic days or in the event of a bushfire. It also has information about websites and contacts you should have in your phone for easy access in an emergency. The frequently asked questions are comprehensive and should answer any questions you have, however, please don't hesitate to contact the school if you would like to know more.

Deputy Principals Report

Media attention and talk between adults may make some children feel anxious about bushfires and it is a great idea to involve children in the design of a plan.
