Working on empathy helps us to identify, understand and feel what another person is feeling. When we show empathy or we do something kind for someone else our brain releases oxytocin. This leads to increasing our self-esteem/confidence, energy levels, positivity and overall happiness.

Whole Family Activity: Neighbourhood Kindness Challenge As a family, choose an act of kindness from the list below that you would like to do for a neighbour or family friend. Each family member can select one to commit to, or you can choose to do one together.

- Cook them something delicious like a cake, hotbread, or cookies

- Design them a Thank You card.

- Choose a little plant from your garden to give them.
- Make them a gift from things around your house.

As a part of the program Amber was able to participate in the Aboriginal Careers Exploration (ACE) program, this involved a week in Adelaide with her fellow Year 10 SAASTA students.

While in Adelaide, Amber was lucky enough to see an array of career and training sectors and have some hands on experience in these fields. Plumbing, engineering, animal care, university site visits, artificial intelligence, film making were just some of the industries she explored.

There were cultural experiences throughout the week, including art, weaving, cultural centre and museums, listening to and speaking with Aboriginal business owners and visiting businesses owned and operated by Aboriginal people.

During the week there was an amazing r-ACE where each academy completed tasks and visited businesses around the city collecting points. We walked over 12km and out of 18 schools we came 4th, winning a traditional weaving workshop.

Amber says: "It helped me finalise my decision of what I want to study when I finish school. It was exhausting but lots of fun, meeting new people and getting to know and make friends with the Whyalla students was a highlight for me."



DUKE OF ED AWARD

The Duke of Edinburgh Award is recognised internationally. Participants are able to achieve at bronze, silver or gold levels while developing life skills including teamwork, organisation, leadership, communication, and perseverance.

As Award Leader I remember fondly the fun we've had on adventurous journeys, the new skills learnt, service given and involvement in physical activity. Highlights include the games of Mafia at Mambray Creek; Laura and co. sliding down Mt Cavern; the 'drunken' emu stalking our tents; Gabby's muddy shampoo at Wilpena; Taitum slipping across the creek; Op Flinders exercises and 'do you think you should check the map??' MAKING HER MARK CONFERENCE

Cowell Area School Year 10s attended the 'Making her Mark' conference at Nautilus Theatre on Friday.

Students listened to the real-life stories of female industry leaders. They heard about challenges overcome, choices available and the rewards of being brave and leaping into the unknown.

This supports the messages of The Resilience Project which our school was fortunate to win funding for from Coles this year.

Our students responded to the authentic voices and experiences of women in primary industries, trades, government and education.

They learned about how one woman turned an administrative error in Y12 into a global career on the high seas and the importance of turning hurdles into jumping off points. They heard from pilots, plumbers, primary industry, politicians and planners.

When you grow up in a close, nurturing community like the one that surrounds Cowell Area School, stepping outside that safe space can be scary. And our students don't know what they don't know. That's why Cowell is committed to these quality industry immersion opportunities to help open up doors - and new ideas - for our students.

Speakers emphasising the importance of exploring alternative pathways, committing to study, and undertaking quality work experience.

Conference attendee and Year 10 student Katrina Parfitt is aiming for a career in audiology, so this event modelled high level success in demanding pathways for her to aspire to.

Danielle Churchett, alternatively, is still exploring the opportunities ahead of her.

'I didn't know there's so many ways to go into aviation, or all the jobs in fishing,' Danielle said.

Year 10 and 11 students at Cowell Area School will head out for Work Experience in Week 11 in a range of industries including animal health and welfare, ICT and programming, automotive industries, health and beauty, as well as primary industries.
