Uniform Sub-Committee

Cowell Area School Governing Council is calling for parent expressions of interest to be part of a Uniform Sub-Committee.

This committee will review the current Uniform Policy, which was introduced at the beginning of the year 2000, and investigate issues of supply, quality and aesthetics as highlighted by parents, students and staff.

The purpose of a Uniform Policy is to support students within and beyond the school learning environment in the following ways. It will:

- Enable the students to develop a sense of identity, belonging and pride in their school
- Encourage the selection of clothing that supports active participation in all school activities.
- Defuse a competitive environment where students are labelled according to clothing and fashions.
- Provide an aspect of Health and Safety whereby students are more easily recognisable, both within school and out-of-school activities.

Uniform adherence continues to be highlighted in ongoing community consultation, parent, student and staff feedback.

According to the current policy, a full uniform constitutes:

- Navy Blue and/or Gold Polo Shirt
- · Blue Checked Skirt or Dress
- Navy Blue Shorts or Trousers (not including leggings) or Blue Denim Jeans
- Navy Blue branded Hoodie/Rugby Jumper or Navy Windcheater
- A Wide-brimmed Hat.
- · Covered Shoes.

As a child, Tahlia wanted to grow up to be a kindergarten teacher, but today she is considering all her options after school including childcare and individual support.



Snapshot 5: Emotional Literacy

Working on our emotional literacy gives us opportunities to develop our ability to understand and express different emotions. When we improve our emotional literacy, we can work towards recognising our own feelings and our ability to manage them. This allows us to cope with different life situations, such as managing conflict, making friends, coping in difficult situations and being resilient when dealing with change.

Whole Family Activity:

Feelings Charades

- Gather together as a family, this might be around the dinner table, lounge room, around the fire outside.
- Take turns to act out a feeling or emotion. Use your face and body language to act this out, For example: Make an angry face and stamp your feet or
- Other family members need to guess the feeling/ emotion.
- After someone has guessed the feeling/emotion, have family members discuss a time they have felt this way before and why. If it was a negative emotion, how did they overcome it?

Family Habit Builder:

Around the dinner table, ask everyone to share a feeling they felt during that day. Discuss how they dealt with that feeling and then discuss and share strategies you could use when faced with particular feelings.

Dear Parent/Guardian

Re: Wellbeing and Engagement Collection survey

Our students have been invited to take part in the Wellbeing and Engagement Collection survey. The survey will be open in weeks 2 to 5 of term 2 (Monday 8 May to Friday 2 June 2023).

Purpose of the survey

Young people's wellbeing is an important part of how they learn at school. The survey seeks students' views about their wellbeing and their engagement with school. Students in years 4 to 12 across the state will be invited to participate and the information collected will help the education system and broader community to support young people's health and wellbeing.

What is the survey about?

The survey asks students about their social and emotional wellbeing, school relationships, engagement and learning in school, physical health and wellbeing and after school activities.

How will students complete the survey?

Teachers will arrange for students to do the survey during class time. They will be asked if they would like to participate and are free to withdraw at any time. If you do not want your child to participate, please contact the school as soon as possible after receiving this letter.

Will students' information be kept confidential?

Students' personal information and identity will remain anonymous. Survey responses are confidential and no one (including school staff) can use the results to identify individual students. Participating schools with fewer than 5 students undertaking the survey will not receive a report of results, to protect the confidentiality of students.

What will happen if a student is distressed during or after the survey?

The survey includes some questions on topics such as student happiness and bullying.

Teachers will inform students that:

- · if they find the survey uncomfortable or distressing, they should leave the survey immediately
- it is not compulsory to take part in the survey as a whole
- students can skip individual survey questions if they wish.

Students who would like to speak to an adult about any concerns they may have will be supported to do so.

Anzac Day 2023

The Cowell RSL sub-branch held a service near dawn commemorating Anzac Day. The service was well attended by local families and visitors. Cowell Area School students Riley Barrett, Noah Baker and Lily Salter laid a wreath on behalf of the school. Riley and Noah also read about Private JY Pengelley, a soldier from Cowell who was killed during WW1. Poppies were placed in the Main St by Emmersyn Turner. Many people have viewed the flags at the cemetery, showing service from past community members. We thank the RSL for allowing us to be involved in their special day.









Anzac Day: tribute to a soldier named on Cowell's cenotaph

John Young Pengelley (service no 2152) was born in Crystal Brook, South Australia. At the time of enlistment he was 24 years old, with brown hair and of medium build. Pengelley was a farm labourer, he declared his home town as Yabmana, Franklin Harbour, SA.

Pengelley joined the 16th Infantry Battalion, 6th Reinforcements in March 1915. After a short time in Egypt he was transported to Gallipoli in July 1915. At that time the 16th Battalion was involved in creating and defending the front line of the ANZAC beachhead.

Late in 1915 Pengelley's mother and sister became alarmed when they stopped receiving letters from him. The family contacted Base Records and the Red Cross, asking about their son and brother. In March, the following year the Red Cross replied that Private Pengelley was last heard of unofficially as being sick and in England. Months later and with no further news, a friend, Mr FA Beinke (of Narridy Creek, via Cowell, Franklin Harbour) also helped write letters enquiring of Private Pengelley. The AIF informed the family in May 1916 that Private Pengelley was at Gallipoli during August 1915 but there were no other details of his whereabouts.

While serving in France, family friend Private RW Robertson of the 27th Battalion demonstrated the close bonds between enlisted men from the West Coast when he wrote to authorities:

'In the trenches – France

Friday May 12th 1916

Si

Would you kindly write to me and let me know of any particulars concerning a young chap that came away with the 6th Reinforcements to the 16th Battalion. I know his people well and they have been unable to get any news of him whatever and as I am unable to visit the 16th I thought I would write to you'

In July 1917 the Pengelley family was informed from the AIF that

"thorough inquiries were made, no information was found. Presumed alive unsure where".

With three boys on the Western Front (the youngest being 18 years old) the family stated they were looking on the positive side that at least John Pengelley hadn't been reported as dead. They continued to write to many agencies seeking further information.

Finally in September 1917, a court of inquiry at Rouen, France found that Private John Young Pengelley was Killed In Action on the Gallipoli Peninsula during August 1915.

Pengelley's younger brother, Sidney returned to Australia after serving on the Western Front where he contracted tuberculosis; while his older brother, Arthur, was taken Prisoner of War and held in Germany. The Pengelleys demonstrated great persistence while sending letters back and forth for years enquiring after their son. John Young Pengelley was obviously a much loved and greatly missed member of their family.

John Young Pengelley's name is inscribed on our cenotaph. He has no known grave and is listed at the Lone Pine Memorial, Turkey. He is also remembered on the Adelaide National War Memorial, Australian War Memorial Roll of Honour, Cowell Men from Franklin Harbour WW1 Roll of Honour and the Kimba Man Boll of Honour




