Principal's News

This week at school has been quite different and quiet with majority of secondary students being offsite on camps and excursions. We farewelled our Year 8, 9 and 10 students on Saturday afternoon as they left for Canberra. From conversations I have had with the staff and the photos that have been sent through it looks like they are having a wonderful time.









On Monday the Year 11/12 English students went to Port Lincoln to watch a Euphoria Stage Play as part of their English Assessment in which they will complete an analysis.

Yesterday we farewelled our Year 7 students who are trekking around the Flinders Ranges for the rest of the week. We hope the weather is favourable over the next coming days while they are camping and hiking.

We also have several students leaving today who will be attending the STEM Aboriginal Congress in Adelaide. The STEM Aboriginal Learner Congress is an exciting annual 2 day event for Aboriginal learners in Years 5 - 10, who attend a South Australian Department for Education school. The congress is a South Australian Department for Education initiative to engage and inspire the next generation of young Aboriginal Scientists, Technologists, Engineers and Mathematicians. The congress connects Aboriginal learners to STEM through a range of interactive and challenging STEM experiences designed to demonstrate that Aboriginal learners are powerful STEM learners and lead thinkers. The congress aims to increase Aboriginal learners' engagement and achievement in STEM related subjects at school and provide a broader understanding of future STEM career pathways. It is co-designed and facilitated by the Young Aboriginal STEM Thinkers of SA (YASTSA), STEM teachers, Aboriginal undergraduates, STEM/Industry experts and education leaders. Attending Aboriginal learners, teachers and quests are expected to actively engage in critical thinking and inquiry-based learning. Connections to culture and STEM are integral to the design of the congress program. Previous STEM workshops have included: Forensic Science, Biomechanics, Water Filtration, Robotics, Dance and Astronomy. These are conducted on-site and off-site at various locations along the North Terrace precinct.

This week I am away in Melbourne at a conference discussing Artificial Intelligence and how do we use it to teach and learn and what might the future be for us as educators in an AI rich world. We are also discussing and exploring the importance and relevance of digital literacy in curriculum design and delivery and maintaining equity in a digital landscape. It has been a really thought provoking and challenging experience.

We will continue with lunch orders one day a week, and this day will change depending on staffing and the delivery time of items.




