#### **Come and Try Aquaculture Day**

Below is the article that will be in the Advocate about the day last week.

Cowell Area School and Eyre Shellfish are shining the spotlight on aquaculture pathways, following a collaborative careers immersion day with local oyster and aquaculture industry leaders last week.

Students from Year 9 and 10 at Cowell were joined by Miltaburra Area School.

This event marks a revitalised industry partnership for Cowell Area School's STEM and careers curriculum.

"Cowell Area School enjoys a close relationship with our broader community and we want to take every opportunity to highlight the expertise and learning happening around us on Eyre Peninsula," Principal Stephenie Herbert said.

"This collaboration meant our students were able to experience some of the real-world requirements of this industry - learning about the design process BST undertook to create their industry-leading oyster baskets, sampling oyster weights and calculating batch numbers."

Students were able to experience all aspects of oyster farming, starting in the Eyre Shellfish hatchery and nursery undertaking a range of activities including oyster grading, counting and weighing oysters, water testing, algae sampling, washing oysters in the raceways and constructing oyster baskets.

"They now have a better understanding of the safety requirements to work out on the water and the variety of qualifications necessary to be active in primary industries."

Local industry partners supporting the day included Shuck Me Oysters, Cowell Seafood Producers, Franklin Harbour Oysters, Turners Aquaculture, BST Oysters, Eyre Shellfish and Clean Air Global. TAFE SA spoke with students about aquaculture pathways opportunities, while Cowell Lions Club hosted a lunch for community members and students alike.

SACE maths and science teacher Stacy Michael welcomed the day as an opportunity to offer examples of real-world science back in her classroom at Cowell Area School.

"This experience will make my teaching more hands-on and industry-related, offering students more concrete examples of what they're learning and how it applies to the real world.



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## School News STEM Congress & SAASTA

Arriving in Glenelg in the evening we wore off some energy at the playgroup before dinner, card games and bed - ready for our STEM congress.

Thursday saw an early start as we journeyed to the Adelaide Convention Centre. The day commenced with Uncle Moogey's moving welcome to Country and a heartfelt welcome to the congress. A powerful dance against racism and Mr. Peter Malinauskas's address about First Nations' innovation, science, and exploration set the tone. He encouraged our youth to embrace curiosity, new concepts, and self-confidence.

Next, we were captivated by Daniel Riley, a renowned artist whose global travels showcased the intersection of STEM and the performing arts. He illustrated how STEM infiltrates dance and theatre via lighting, music, props, and advertising. The day progressed with breakout sessions. Our group focused on tracking, delving into the historical significance of this skill in survival and policing. Replicating tracks, crafting stories with markings, and identifying different footprints enthralled the students, as revealed by Bethany and Floyd's enthusiasm.

After lunch we immersed ourselves in a presentation by Natan Noel, a Marine Scientist working on an electric submarine design. Motivated by his work, we designed balloon-powered vehicles, igniting a competitive spirit. Bethany's triumphant victory in the race left her beaming. We closed the day listening to Peter Reeve an enthusiastic Scientist who majored in Physics, with studies in Astro and Atmospheric Physics.

The evening took us to Marion, where the lolly shop experienced a frenzy of activity in the form of Bethany and Floyd. Amidst laughter, Floyd's antics had Miss Claire trying some extremely sour sweets. We concluded the day with playground antics in Glenelg before returning to our Airb'n'b.

Friday dawned with a brisk walk along the Karrawirra Parri (River Torrens), navigating swans and speedy cyclists. As friendships with students from other sites blossomed, Mickey and Claire were excited to see new connections forming amongst the students. Bethany and Floyd found joy in the Convention Centre escalators and lifts- riveting. Bethany's interview at the STEM congress echoed her gratitude for this Aboriginal-led gathering of innovative minds as she stated "we're really lucky to be here with all these Aboriginal kids. We get to do cool activities and listen to really inspiring people".

Our final day featured a presentation connecting technology and culture by Mikaela Jade, a park ranger who developed an app weaving stories with QR codes in national parks. The QR codes will be scanned by walkers as they reaped through national parks, where they will be provided information about the people, place, plants or stories that are relevant to that exact area. Inspired by this, we journeyed to Tamtanya Zoo (Adelaide Zoo), collaborating on an animal hunt. Back at the convention centre, we absorbed Corey Tutts's wisdom: "Find your passion and pursue it. If you're unsure what you're passionate about, just try something." Our minds brimming with ideas, we embarked on the journey back to Cowell, equal parts invigorated and exhausted.

During week five, we received an invitation for our SAASTA class to join Whyalla Secondary College's afternoon tea. Hosted by Senior SAASTA students, it was a great opportunity for our Connect (younger) students to see their older peers working within SAASTA. We were shown the students' artwork and creative projects which showcased the vibrant engagement within the program. Students are also exposed to aboriginal education, mental health and community supports that are relevant to our local area.

This event not only offered a glimpse into the senior years of SAASTA, but also inspired our Connect students by revealing the potential of their futures in the program. A shout out to Ky and Amber for their efforts in organising the day along with their Whyalla peers.

Lastly, SAASTA students are in the process of submitting artwork into a competition. Each student has contributed to a final piece that was collated by Haden. The winning school of the statewide competition will have their artwork printed on SAASTA uniforms and will be used in promotional material.




