Principal's News

We are already into Week 7 and there is plenty of great learning opportunities occurring for students across the year levels. We celebrated book week, the MFS visited yesterday to talk to us about fire safety and we have SMG here Thursday and Friday for talks on Failure Matters and Friendship Matters.

On the last student free day, staff continued on the learning journey of monitoring and measuring student progress utilising a range of teaching strategies, such as, learning intentions and success criteria, heat maps, rubrics and know and show charts. I also shared the student interview data showing students are knowing what they are learning, why they are learning the topic and how do they use the success criteria to help them. It was great to hear the students being able to articulate what they are learning and why with a deeper understanding of the purpose and the relevance of the learning taking place.

We are embarking on this area as part of the Departments Strategic Plan and the 4 Areas of Impact. One of these is Learner Agency and at Cowell Area School we want our students to be able to self-assess and monitor their work and the important role that feedback plays to assist them with this.

Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT)

The Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) are online reading comprehension and maths assessments aligned to the Australian Curriculum that provide teachers with information about their students' learning strengths and needs.

The PAT 4-week window began this week with the assessment being mandatory for Year 3 to Year 10 students. Our Year 1 and Year 2 students will also be experiencing the test platform as we look to expose them to the types of questions and online assessment to be experienced in the coming years.

PAT is one of many ways we gather valuable information on the progress of our students and helps to inform our curriculum future actions.

STEM Aboriginal Congress

Last Wednesday to Friday I had the opportunity to take 5 of our Aboriginal Students to Adelaide to engage with Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics learning and industry experiences to inspire them to realise their aspirations and take on challenging subjects at school and in future learning. The Congress is designed to connect students to their cultural identity and explore other cultural identities with Aboriginal STEM knowledge to unlock future STEM pathways. They were part of 850 students from over 186 schools being represented.

Over the two days we engaged with young Aboriginal People and listened to them and their journey. Key note speakers were Tiahni Adamson with is currently working for CH4 Global on the Asparagopsis and is the current 2024 Young Australian of the Year for South Australia. The other speaker was Arthur Ah Chee who has created his own First Nations gaming and visualisation studio in Adelaide and has worked on games such as Call of Duty – Modern Warfare and complete visualisations for various museums and Government Agencies.

Along with this we experienced an orienteering session at the Adelaide Zoo, were shown a drone footage of their reenactment of the dreamtime story of the Seven Sisters as well as being taught basket Weaving by the Amata Anangu School and then learnt how Aboriginal people built fish traps with the Deadly Science team from Sydney.


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


2024 NAPLAN HIGHLIGHTS

- 65 Cowell Area School students sat NAPLAN in 2024
- Our students were Strong in 19 out of the 20 assessed areas.
- 48% of Year 5, 7 and 9 students registered Upper Level Growth (compared to a national average of 25%)
- 98% of Year 5, 7 and 9 students were in the medium or upper areas of growth for Numeracy.
- Staff will use NAPLAN, in conjunction with many other assessment strategies, to continue to support growth in Literacy and Numeracy for Cowell Area Schools.

Headlines are often more shocking than substantial, but here at Cowell Area School the NAPLAN news is positive.

The National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9, and is the only nationwide assessment that all Australian children undertake.

The program tests students' ability in three domains of Literacy—reading, writing and language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation)—and in Numeracy. Schools in all states and territories have administered NAPLAN in the first half of every year since 2008.

NAPLAN undertook a major overhaul in 2023.

New proficiency standards with four levels of achievement - Needs Additional Support, Developing, Strong and Exceeding - have replaced the previous 10-band structure.

The data in our second year of the new system shows us that (on average) Cowell Area School students are Strong in 19 out of 20 of the assessment areas.

This is a great result!

The school's ongoing focus of improvement for every student in every classroom has manifested in the data as 48% of Year 5, 7 and 9 students registering Upper Level Growth as compared to a national average of 25%. (Year 3s do not have comparative figures as they are the earliest grade to undertake NAPLAN each year.)

Numeracy improvement was a standout result, with 98% of Year 5, 7 and 9 students in the medium or upper areas of growth.

The new proficiency standards include a baseline benchmark to identify students who are likely to need additional support.

"These important changes mark a reset for NAPLAN that makes use of the online adaptive tests to deliver better information for parents, carers and teachers," said ACARA CEO, David de Carvalho.

"The standard for proficiency is set at a challenging but reasonable level. If your child is in the Strong or Exceeding category, it means they have demonstrated proficiency and that their Literacy or Numeracy skills are where they should be at this stage of their schooling.

"If your child has not yet achieved proficiency, then they will either be in the Developing category or the Needs Additional Support category.

"This is powerful information in the hands of parents/carers and teachers, and will enable much more meaningful conversations between them about how our children and young people are developing the foundational skills they need," Mr de Carvalho said.

NAPLAN is just one of many continual data collection points in a child's educational journey at Cowell Area School, all of which are compared and studied to inform better teaching and better learning for our students.

Year 10s are taking measurements of Barbie and applying a scale factor to convert her to a life-size 2D drawing.


Year 11 Biology - making a working model of our lungs. Showing how the diaphragm is essential in drawing air into the lungs.

Year 11s have been testing antibacterial products and found that none are 100% effective in removing all bacteria. They swabbed door handles around the school and tested the time of washing hands and the temperature of the soap on the effectiveness of the products. The results were inconclusive, but we did find out that the surfaces around the school, including our keyboards and mobile phones are covered in germs.

OPERATION FLINDERS PEER MENTOR SCHEME

Year 11 Danielle Churchett returns back to school this month after an exciting challenge as part of the Operation Flinders Peer Mentor scheme.

Danielle, who undertook Operation Flinders as a Year 10 student in 2023, was invited back this year as part of the organisation's mentoring program, helping to lead a school group from Yorketown Area School through the Flinders, sharing her own experiences and learning with a new group of students.

"We had to set everything up for the exercise, plan navigation before the event, teach the participants about their roles and responsibilities, and encourage them through the challenges," Danielle said.

"Part of my role was to demonstrate how to do things that they hadn't done before. But my main role was to encourage, help and support and talk to them so that they didn't give up and they went home feeling positive and accomplished.

"When I did Operation Flinders I enjoyed learning about myself, better understanding my capabilities and overcoming challenges."

Through Operation Flinders, Danielle is also undertaking a series of environmental camps, a Certificate II in Outdoor Education, and will be recognised for her involvement in the program through the Duke of Edinburgh.

This week, Danielle was one of a group of Year 11s who spoke to our Year 10s about their upcoming Operation Flinders campaign in Term 4.

Danielle would encourage upcoming Year 10s to join Operation Flinders and not underestimate their ability to overcome physical and mental challenges.

Important Information for Parents/Caregivers

Medication in Schools



Medication can't be administered in an education or care service without written advice on a medication agreement (agreement forms available from the school) (with the exception of emergency medication for anaphylaxis and asthma). Medication can't be administered by education and care staff where:

- a medication agreement has been modified, overwritten or is illegible
- any medication rights are in doubt.

All sections of the 'medication instructions' must be completed and match the pharmacy label on the medication.

All requirements listed in the 'authorisation and release' section must be checked and parent or guardian details entered.

The 'agreement' section must be completed by a treating health professional where the medication is:

- a controlled drug
- oxygen
- pain relief (ie paracetamol, ibuprofen) that is needed regularly or administered for more than 72 hours (3 days) in a week.

Who is responsible for providing medication to the education and care service?

The parent or guardian is responsible for providing all medication and administration equipment. They should be encouraged to give and collect any medication in person where possible. Where this is not possible, the education and care staff, in consultation with the parent or guardian, should discuss and agree on safe methods of transport and transfer.

All medications must be provided in an original pharmacy container and have a pharmacy label with:

- child or young person's name
- date of dispensing
- name of medication
- strength of medication
- dose (how much to give)
- when the dose should be given
- other administration instructions (ie to be taken with food)
- expiry date (where there is no expiry date the medication must have been dispensed within the last 6 months).

First dose

Children and young people should not be given a first dose of a new medication at an education or care service. Due to the dangers of an adverse reaction the first dose must be supervised by a parent, guardian or health professional. An exception to this is emergency medications, including Ventolin or adrenaline, and midazolam (where this has been prescribed).

Three times a day administration

Generally, medication that requires administration three times per day can be administered outside of school hours. At home in the morning, after school and in the evening.

Medication 'to be taken as required', 'as directed', or 'PRN'

Medication that is labelled 'to be taken as required', 'as directed', 'PRN' (or simllar) doesn't provide enough information and can't be administered by the education staff.

The medication agreement must say the time of administration. Education and care staff can't make a clinical decision about when to give medication based on a child or young person's symptoms or behaviour. An exception to this is where there is an:

- emergency medication management plan to administer midazolam for seizures
- ASCIA action plan for anaphylaxis or allergy that includes adrenaline or antihistamine on the plan
- asthma care plan that includes Ventolin on the plan.

General use emergency response medicines

Education and care services can store and administer the following general use medications for emergency response (does not apply in family day care or respite care program):

- adrenaline autoinjector (EpiPen® or EpiPen®Jr or Anapen®) for emergency treatment of anaphylaxis
- reliever puffer for example salbutamol (Ventolin*) for emergency treatment of asthma.
- Pain relief such as paracetamol or ibuprofen are not permitted in education and care services as medication for first aid. They can mask signs and symptoms or serious illness or injury.

Controlled drugs

Controlled drugs (also known as drugs of dependence or Schedule 8 drugs) are prescription medicines that have a higher potential for misuse, abuse and dependence. The use of drugs of dependence are regulated by the Controlled Substances Act 1984 and the Controlled Substances (Poisons) Regulations 2011 and monitored by the Drugs of Dependence Unit (DDU). Controlled drugs that may be prescribed to children and young people and administered in an education and care service

Controlled drugs that may be prescribed to children and young people and administered in an education and care service include psychostimulant medication for the management of ADHD, for example methylphenidate (Ritalin*) or dexamphetamine

Schedule 8 (controlled drugs)

- Schedule 8 (controlled drugs) have high potential for abuse and addiction. The possession of these medications without authority is an offence. The doctor must have a permit to prescribe schedule 8 medications. The possession of these medications without authority is an offence.
- Medication agreement must be completed by a health professional.
- Authorisation to administer controlled medicines must be completed by principal or director and authorised staff member.



Unscheduled medications

Medications that are sold in other retail outlets (ie supermarkets) in addition to pharmacies i.e. antacids (e.g. Mylanta", Gaviscon"), throat lozenges, paracetamol, aspirin, ibuprofen must be accompanied by a Medication agreement form completed by the parent or guardian unless it is for pain relief medications that are required to be administered more than 72 hours in a week, the "agreement" section must be completed by health professional.


